### **BACKGROUND**

Community Services League (CSL) has been providing a wide array of programs and services to support Independence families since 1916. Some of our more notable programs in Independence include:



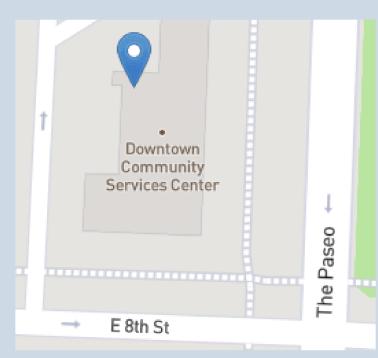
| Food pantry and emergency assistance    | Offered at three Independence locations   |

### **COMMUNITY DIALOGUE**

In recent years, community conversations, locally and across America, are dominated by the number of homeless individuals on the streets. There are many root causes, but substance abuse, mental health challenges, and skyrocketing rental rates are three reasons that many people are unhoused in our community. The COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated all of those challenges and forced more people onto the streets.



Communities can often turn a blind eye to the problem and hope it goes it away, but that rarely works. Most meaningful change processes involve a coach and/or mentor to help guide someone, and that's the same with a person exiting homelessness. Successful models show that persons leaving homelessness need wraparound supports and someone to walk alongside them in their journey.



## **DROP-IN CENTER MODEL**

The Beehive in Kansas City (corner of 8th and Paseo) is a "drop-in center" model that welcomes persons living without a permanent home. Among the many services offered by a drop-in center are laundry service, meals, and showering capabilities. All of these services are life functions that many of us take for granted, but are often impossible to access if you are on the streets.

For a change process to start, there must be trust. A safe and welcoming facility can help build trust, which leads to a meaningful relationship. CSL staff, along with other community partners form the front-line team to help build positive relationships among our unhoused neighbors.

### THE OPPORTUNITY IN FRONT OF ROTARY

Eastern Jackson County needs a drop-in center in order to make more progress in helping individuals obtain permanent housing. Good Shepherd Community of Christ has offered to be our partner in bringing the EJC Drop-In Center to life.

The current facility has showering and meal capacity that need minor upgrades, and laundry can be added for a nominal cost. The EJC Drop-In Center would be open during normal business hours, and guests would be able to find their case manager there for consultation, along with mental and physical health services, dental and vision programs, a place to receive mail, a fresh meal program, laundry facilities, showering services, and a variety of other opportunities.

CSL would be the lead agency for the EJC Drop-In Center and would provide permanent staff for the operation. To bring the program online, we estimate the following costs:

**\$10,000** \*Facility Renovations/Accessibility/Security

**\$10,000** \*Shower Upgrades

\$10,000 \*Kitchen Upgrades

**\$15,000** \*Laundry

\$25,000 Utilities for two years

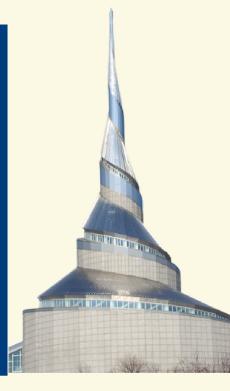
\$50,000 Meals for two years

**\$150,000** Staff/Program Expenses for two years

\$100,000 Security for two years

**\$370,000** Total

\*Denotes one-time capital expenses/upgrades

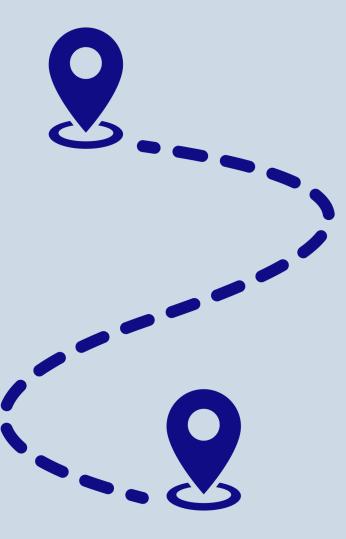


For programs to gain a foothold in a community, and to build trust and rapport, we must deliver on consistency. Consistency means we are open when we say we will be, and that we deliver on what we commit to. We aim to secure the funding, resources, and partnerships needed for the first two years of the Drop-In Center's operation in EJC.

### **OUTCOMES**

We believe that, in addition to better health outcomes for unhoused individuals, CSL and partners will make meaningful change in the lives of 300 unhoused persons over the first two years. This means they will be on a path towards permanent housing and will have made progress towards that goal.

This program is also beneficial to neighbors and commercial operations in the City, as it provides a viable place for people to visit, and can help alleviate the number of homeless individuals lingering in dangerous public rights-of-way.
